Announcing LWVNE/AAUW-NE Legislative Day, February 25, 2015

The League of Women Voters of Nebraska (LWVNE) and the American Association of University Women of Nebraska (AAUW-NE) are again sponsoring a combined lobby day with state senators in Lincoln on **Wednesday, February 25, 2015**. **Mark your calendars now and plan to participate in this "democracy in action" event.**

The day will start with a briefing in the Board Room of the Nebraska State Education Association (NSEA) Office Building at 605 South 14th Street directly across the street west of the Capitol Building. The briefing will focus on three bills or resolutions that have priority status for both LWVNE and AAUW-NE. Participants will then have the opportunity to visit with state senators about these three pieces of legislation and why they are important to the members of both organizations. The day will conclude with a luncheon at the Governor's Mansion at Noon. Invite your senator to be your guest.

Now that the 2014 Mid-Term Election is over, it is an ideal time to write a note to your state senator to say that you are an active LWVNE and/or AAUW-NE member. Tell them you will be in touch with them periodically

during the upcoming Unicameral session to encourage them to support the LWVNE/AAUW-NE position on a particular piece of legislation. Your message should be sent by U.S. Mail. Notes of this nature command more attention from the recipient than does an e-mail message or a phone call. This is true for a brand new senator you've never contacted before or one you've lobbied for many years and with whom you have an ongoing relationship.

It's very important to establish and keep the lines of communication open with your senator whether they are a new lawmaker, have one year of experience, or you've known them as a member of the Unicameral for several years. Regular contact will help you get to know them and their stands on issues, and they will become familiar with you as well. When Legislative Day rolls around and you have a chance to visit with him or her, you will not be a stranger to them nor will they be unfamiliar to you. How to Join

Joining AAUW is easy, and where you take that membership is up to you. Who can join?

Membership is open to anyone holding an associate's (or equivalent, e.g. RN), bachelor's, or higher degree from a regionally accredited college or university.

What type of membership is available?

Branch members: Do you want to make a direct impact in your community? Consider joining a local or virtual branch of AAUW, or start one in your area. Includes national membership.

Student affiliation: If your college is already a partner member, you can be a student affiliate for free! If not, bring AAUW to your campus by starting an AAUW student organization!

Tax Deductibility: Because AAUW is a 501(c)(3) charitable membership organization, most of your national dues are tax deductible on your personal federal income tax return.

The purpose of the event is to encourage girls in 6-9th grades to participate in STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics) education and careers. Our event will be held on the campus of the College of Saint Mary during 2015. Amy Bones and I are serving as co-chairs for this project. More details will be forthcoming.

In addition to diligently working on AAUW missions, our members have the opportunity to choose from our 16 different interest groups within four broad categories:
