

Letter from National President

Dear AAUW Leader,

As your newly elected board chair I am thrilled at the opportunity to work with such a dedicated, passionate group of leaders and members. Since back-to-school time typically means back to business in our AAUW communities, I wanted to share some of the priorities at the national office and what opportunities those will present at the state and local level. There is a renewed fervor to take action in our country, and we want to make certain that AAUW is poised to take the lead and harness that energy for the good of women and girls.

First, we are embarking on a comprehensive strategic plan, applying a sharp focus to our mission and translating AAUW's long-term vision into meaningful and tangible impact with shared, well-defined goals toward equity.

Secondly, we are thoroughly committing ourselves to be an inclusive environment. Only by working across and with *all* parts of our population will we encourage widespread support of eliminating the biases that women and girls experience. As you heard in our most <u>recent</u> <u>video</u>, "Why should being a girl mean having to add words like "if" and "only" to my dreams?" It doesn't — and AAUW needs to be a representative population to change that way of thinking through our research, programs, public policy and advocacy, and through systemic cultural change. I encourage you to value all individuals in your community and include them in AAUW's work, for it's through that inclusion that we find continued relevance and growth.

Thirdly, we are experiencing continued growth in interest in STEM curricula for girls and women, and in our salary negotiation workshops. I will give you periodic updates in my bimonthly emails, and you'll find additional information in your twice monthly <u>Mission & Action</u>.

And, as always, we are monitoring legislative changes and making our voice and position known on those detrimentally impacting women and girls. Make certain you receive <u>Action Network</u> (the new Two Minute Activist Mobile will send updates straight to your phone!) and engage with AAUW on Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, and Instagram. Stay informed so that you in turn can inform your community and take advantage of that increased fervor for activism and watch it translate into membership.

We've also been busy creating tools and resources to facilitate your roles as community leaders. In early August you should have received your <u>Leader Resources and</u> <u>Toolkit</u> showing you exactly where you can find pertinent information on the AAUW website. We've outlined a series of skill-building <u>webinars</u> that will be held monthly, and I hope to see many members taking advantage of this opportunity to hone skills useful in their AAUW work. You'll also find information on how to <u>host a program</u> on AAUW's latest research report, *Deeper in Debt: Women and Student Loans*. This report presents an outstanding opportunity to engage many segments of your local community in a discussion of the problem and best practices to bring about change.

We are looking forward to attending our AAUW-NE Fall Conference, *"Empowering Women Across Nebraska"*, on October 21st and learn from our branch leaders about some of their branch highlights and their future focuses. Our Keynote Speaker is Christine Lesiak, a Peabody Award winning producer, who has produced, written and directed numerous award-winning documentaries, specializing in history and the humanities. Christine will share the story of Dr. Susan LaFlesche Picotte (1865-1915) who was born on the Omaha Reservation in eastern Nebraska, and was the youngest of four girls. Susan was the first American Indian women to earn a medical degree, graduated at the top of her class, and a year early. We are excited to learn more about this incredible woman in history and how AAUW helped Dr. LaFlesche Picotte on her journey.

We are very happy to welcome our newest AAUW College/University Affiliate, University of Nebraska-Kearney! We now have ten college affiliates in Nebraska: Bellevue University, College of Saint Mary, Creighton University, Doane University, Kaplan University, Metro Community College, University of Nebraska-Kearney, University of Nebraska-Lincoln, University of Nebraska at Omaha and University of Nebraska Medical Center. About seven college students plan to attend our Fall Conference. Please take the time to say "hello" if you see them at our conference.

Our Omaha Branch plans to host our 4th Tech Savvy conference on Saturday, April 21, 2018, on the campus of the College of Saint Mary. We are hoping to reach 100 middle school girls and their parents! Our next AAUW National Convention will not be held in 2019. Instead, it will be scheduled in 2020, to celebrate 100 years since women had the right to vote. This is a great time to be an AAUW member – yes, we do make a positive difference in the lives of women and girls in Nebraska!

We were all energized by the things we learned at the convention, and what we learned influenced plans for this year in our Omaha Branch. We learned a lot about social networking at the convention, and as a result some of our members led by President Elect Sapphire Anderson are currently creating a Facebook page that will highlight the activities of our branch. Our Program Vice President Denise Britigan attended convention programs focusing on programs for general meetings; she arranged for this year's programs to be ones that highlight stories of successful efforts in Omaha to empower women. Our September program was about the Adolescent Health Project begun by the Women's Fund of Omaha, and our next program in November focuses on work to reduce human trafficking in Nebraska. Finally, we have begun a discussion concerning an idea for an open-to-the-public 2018 panel discussion event on media literacy, a topic we heard about at the convention. AAUW researched media literacy and indicated further information is forthcoming; upon receipt of that information, we will continue our consideration of this event.

Probably our biggest branch news of all is, thanks to the hard work of our Finance Officer Linda Bors, our branch is now recognized by the IRS as having 501(c)(3) non-profit status. That means donations to our branch are tax deductible and it allows us to apply for grants only available to 501(c)(3) organizations. We are also building on past successes. Our members continue to support Sherman Elementary School's needy children with clothes, books, and scholarships for two girls to attend a science camp sponsored by UNO. Our fall clothing give-away at Sherman School is scheduled for November 9. Led by our Director Marilyn Bombac, we are once again planning another Tech Savvy event – a day of STEM-focused activities for middle-school girls on April 21, 2018. As we have for several years, we plan to co-sponsor with College of Saint Mary a spring event with a speaker, this time perhaps focused on leadership skills for women. And as I write this paragraph, we are busy organizing and preparing for the AAUW-Nebraska Fall Conference in Omaha on October 21. We are looking forward to welcoming our AAUW Nebraska members from other parts of the state.

AAUW Fellowships and Grants with Nebraska Connections by Linda Bors

The following AAUW programs show some of the ways AAUW National and AAUW-Nebraska are impacting and influencing each other during fiscal year 2017-18. In order to have enough funds for the recipients, all AAUW-Nebraska sponsored endowment recipients were co-sponsored with other AAUW endowments. This enables an award from each endowment every year.

Luz Sarmiento, a citizen of Colombia, is the recipient of an International Fellowship which was sponsored in part by the **Louise Pound International Fellowship** endowment. She is working on a PhD in clarinet performance at the University of Texas in Austin. Luz is deeply committed to educational development and the promotion of music and art as a means of social transformation. Her work with young musicians in under-served regions of Colombia has demonstrated the benefits of music in socially vulnerable communities and inspired young Colombian women to pursue a career in the arts.

Rhea Gillan is the recipient of a Career Development Grant which was co-sponsored by six **Research** and **Projects Grant (R&PG)** endowments, including three sponsored by AAUW-Nebraska: **Anne Campbell R&GP, Esther Hamon / Leola McKie R&PG**, and **Stan and Mary (Browne) Tyler RP&G**. Rhea currently works as a high school science teacher focusing on raising the level of science literacy in her rural, central Nebraska school district. She coordinates a successful program in which students complete cutting-edge, authentic scientific research. Her goal is to obtain a master's degree in biology at the University of Nebraska at Kearney so that she can better mentor students. She hopes to bridge the gender gap and encourage more women to pursue science, technology, engineering, or math (STEM) careers.

There aren't any other current AAUW fellowship or grant recipients studying in Nebraska.
